# ~ Journey - A review of the Church Weekend ~

Last weekend Union Chapel took their annual expedition for a weekend away, this year to Thornleigh in Grange Over Sands. The title of the weekend was Journeys (note the plural- this was not a weekend about the seventies rock band Journey) and led us through a contemplation of the Israelites' Exodus and our own religious and spiritual journeys. It was postulated that the Israelites had never actually been to Egypt and more worryingly that the Egyptians were a highly inclusive society and although there was a clear hierarchy there was never any slavery in Egypt (with the possible exception of the building of the city Rameses) which is not bad going for a society that lasted for 3000 years over 5000 years ago. I think the Dreamworks studio might need to issue an apology for the misrepresentation of Egyptian culture in their film the Prince of Egypt. Although on the plus side it does have some cracking musical numbers.

This reviewer rated the weekend very highly (nothing to do with familial loyalty) but in case you were looking for the views of a more impartial attendee someone noted that we had been "fed well in there (indicating the dining room) and also nourished in here

(indicating the session room)."
While we are on this subject I think it is important to note the high quality of food provided on the weekend. A 'light lunch' on the Saturday consisted of burger (deliciously pink) and hot, fluffy chips with warm chocolate cake and ice cream for



pudding. I think it was not wholly unpredictable that when asked in a session to choose our three essentials from a 'packing list' of doctrine, worship and spiritual disciplines no one suggested fasting.

On Saturday afternoon people were free to wander of their own accord. While some went on a health giving and bracing walk up



some rocky terrain others strolled along the promenade or went to explore the myriad of local shops. Grange is surprisingly well provided for in this regard offering a labyrinth of second hand books in its bookshops, a dazzling amount of vintage jewellery and a surprising number of estate agents. Grange is apparently the place that people in Didsbury retire to (which does somewhat explain the panoply of high end gift shops selling soft furnishings).

The Saturday evening entertainment was of the same high standard as ever. Sketches written by our resident playwright Alan Redhouse

were highly entertaining and also provided a very creative response to the 'Linton House Problem'. If you were not there I



urge you to read the script. We also had work from new writers, Earnshaw and Howes, and they are indeed a promising new generation of writers. It was an hilarious sketch with first class



performances but it still was able to pose some profound and thought provoking questions- why couldn't Rose just have shifted over on that door in the middle of the Atlantic? "Perhaps Kate Winslet is more dense than we know." Thankfully though any element of farce was confined to the stage and other domestic arrangements were carried off very smoothly thanks to Andy Howes.

Many thanks to all who contributed to what was a really fantastic weekend where it was wonderful to be in fellowship with you all. The theme of the weekend was how the Israelites had created their own foundation myth- a metaphorical journey- travelling first away to Egypt in order to come back home. To quote a wise woman, despite the current uncertainties in our day-to-day life as a church going away on the church weekend always feels like coming home.



# - Ideas for the journey -

This article stems from a conversation after one of the sessions at the recent Union Chapel weekend. We were talking about prayer. For many people there are issues around prayer particularly around prayers of petition. However although they may not want to pray, they still want to grow closer to God.

Over the centuries various practices have developed which are intended to facilitate this. One of the better known is the Ignatian Review of the Day. In this you reflect on the events of the day allowing yourself to be open to new ways of understanding and to what God may be offering to you in this process. Spiritual journaling is similar with the added opportunity of recording your thoughts and insights so that you can come back to them at a future date. A third practice of this type is known as gratitudes in which you reflect on the happenings of the and record three things for which you are grateful.

Spiritual practices of this nature if repeated regularly can start to help us to learn to connect with the eternal and to develop a meaningful way of prayer.

In the last fifty years or so people in the west have become more interested in some of the practices in eastern religions particularly in the various forms of meditation. These allow the mind to settle and the Spirit to enter. Most of these depend on the awareness of the breath going in and out of the body.

The process could be as simple as counting, up to five as the breath goes in and then another five as the breath leaves. A variation could be to breathe in on a word, for example, peace, and breath out the word love.

The mind will wander whatever we try to do. This is normal and as soon as we realise that it is doing so, we can return the attention to the breath.

This is only a very small introduction to the ideas of spiritual practices. If it seems that it is of interest to you, then a small book entitled "Deepening the life of the Spirit" Resources for Spiritual Practice developed by Ginny Wall and available from the Quaker Book Shop in Friends House will provide much more detailed information .

Over the last few weeks, since a family bereavement, I have had an opportunity to experience the care and kindness of this lovely fellowship of Union Chapel. And so as Union Chapel looks forward, with all the challenges that are likely to come our way in order to achieve the best outcome for the future of the church, I think we can be confident in the foundation of the good and lasting relationships between people of the church community. These, when it comes to the crunch, will be the glue that holds us together, even as we may disagree, and will allow us to put the good of the church community above our individual preferences, enabling us to make changes in a positive way.

I am truly hopeful that as we walk together with grace and in fellowship, we will maintain the great values of Union Chapel Church and Community for the benefit of all, including those strangers who are friends we have yet to meet.

# ~ Snippets of Thomas ~

As someone once said, "And now for something completely different". I therefore submit for your perusal some snippets of the Gospel of Thomas.

Scholars have observed that in the early centuries after Christ, there were many Christianities. The version which became the Orthodox one, is described by scholars as proto orthodox. One of the most famous of the Christianities was one which was heavily influenced by Marcion in about AD 140. Marcionite Christianity is interesting, because it attracted a very large following. The underpinning concept of it was that there had to be two gods. The vengeful Old Testament Jewish God, and the loving New Testament God. It relied heavily on Jesus as portrayed in the Gospel of Luke and the ten of the writings of the Apostle Paul. Much of the Marcionite Christianity has been reconstructed from works which criticised it.

Another version of Christianity was influenced by the Gospel According to Thomas. This is an early Christian non-canonical, gospel that many scholars believe provides insight into the oral gospel traditions. It was discovered at Nag Hammadi, near Luxor in Egypt, in December 1945 among a group of books known as the Nag Hammadi library. Further details can be found at *gnosis.org*.

In the gospel of Thomas, there is no narrative. It consists of 114 sayings of Jesus(or logia in Greek, pronounced with a hard g as in logos, meaning word). Many of the logia appear to have been taken directly from the gospel of Matthew or Luke.

According to Thomas, Jesus had a twin brother, Didymus Judas Thomas. Didymus is the Greek word for twin, and in Semitic languages Thomas meant twin. So it seems that his name was simply Judah, or Judas. Perhaps then Didymus and Thomas were nick names, the first being a Greek and the second of Semitic origin.

Orthodox Christianity does not believe that Thomas was Jesus' twin, but in Thomasine Christianity which is very strong in India, Syria and Mesopotamia, it is thought that he was actually Jesus' twin. Thomas is credited with being the apostle who took the gospel to India.

There is also an infancy gospel of Thomas, which describes Jesus as a child, and the Acts of Thomas. In the Act of Thomas, he (Thomas) comes across as very anti marriage and anti-family. Thomas also wrote the Hymn of the Pearl, or its full title is The Hymn of Jude Thomas the Apostle in the country of the Indians. There is also the Book of Thomas the Contender Writing to the Perfect.

Thomas' gospel is often described as a Gnostic gospel. Gnosticism was described in a poem by Theodotus.

Who we were, what we have become,

where we were, whither we were thrown, whither we are hastening, from what we are redeemed, what birth is, what rebirth is.

The answers to the poem are:

Who we were? Divine beings.

What have you become? Become mud, entrapped in a dead body,

trapped in materiality.

Where were you? In Heaven, with the divine Father, with

God

Whither we were thrown? Into the earth.

Where are we hastening? Back to the divine.

What are we redeemed from? From the material world

What is birth? Damnation, because your spark is

entrapped in your body.

What is rebirth? Death or learning of your true self

Sex therefore, was considered to be a bad thing because one is trapping more sparks of light into more bodies. Evil powers try to keep the true self asleep or drunk, in order to keep the evil world together. In other words, they don't want you to learn and they don't want your spark to be able to fly through the realms and back to God at death. But really wise people have the secrets, that if you know, you can use them to unlock the gates that lead back to God. It is as though there are gates at the different levels of heaven and if you have the knowledge, or passwords for each level, you can ascend to the next level. Does this sound familiar? Think computer games!

In logia 21 Mary said to Jesus, "What do your disciples resemble? He said, "What they resemble is children living in a plot of land that is not theirs. When the owners of the land come they will say, 'Surrender our land to us.' They, for their part stripped naked in their presence, in order to give it back to them, and they give them back their land."

It could be an allegory. Who are the owners of the land? The evil powers that rule the earth. Who are the children, who are the real disciples of Jesus? Those people who know enough to say, when the earth is demanded of you, when your body is demanded of you by these evil powers, just give it up, because it is not valuable anyway.

Logia 37: His disciples said, "When will you be shown forth to us, and when shall we behold you?" Jesus said, "When you strip naked without being ashamed and take your garments and put them under your feet like little children and tread upon them. Then you will see the child of the living and you will not be afraid."

The Gnostic interpretation is: Stripping off the material world. When you strip your soul, the spark of the body, and you realise that it's not the real you, then you come to know the real you. I wonder how many obscure writings in the New Testament have overtones of Gnosticism!
